People have started realising that their Second Innings begins after 50.


Travel is not only wonderful. It gives rewarding experiences to anyone that partakes of her delights.


Hello Everyone,

Then on 12th May, we had Prof C P Roy speak on "Geoethics & Development". Though the topic sounded rather complex, Prof Roy broke it down to how each one of us could contribute to enriching



the green cover around us. For every tree that is cut down to widen roads or to enable new construction, he has vowed to plant two trees in its place. The trees in front of our District Hospital, along the Erayilkadavu – Manipuzha Road, and the Cement Kavala



- Thiruvathukkal Road have all been planted by him. He invited members to become part of his "Green Leaf" drive and contribute saplings for his venture.

He also explained the Mullaperiyar controversy in a new way. Building a second dam behind the present one is not possible. Instead, since Kumily is 1300 ft. above Tamil Nadu, he recommended implementation of the Supreme Court Order of 2014 to lower the level of the tunnel pipeline, thereby ensuring the safety of Kerala as well as the water requirements of Tamil Nadu.

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A JOURNEY TO SEE 7 SISTERS

Part 5 (Manipur)

Known as the 'Switzerland of India', Manipur lies in the deep corner of the northeast part of India. It is bordered by the Indian states of Nagaland to the north, Assam to the west, and Mizoram to the southwest and by Myanmar to the south and east.



Manipur is called "A Jewel land" of India because it is surrounded by nine hills with an oval-shaped valley at the centre, a naturally made Jewel. It was once described by Jawaharlal Nehru as "Jewel of India".

The state capital is Imphal, located in the center of the state. It has an airport also which is connected to other areas of the country by daily flights.


The state's economy centers around agriculture and forestry. But trade and cottage industries also are important. Pineapple is the fruit that is most produced in Manipur, Manipur is famous for bamboo forests. It is one of India's largest bamboo producing states and is also a major contributor to the country's bamboo industry. Manipur has the highest number of handicraft units and the highest number of craft persons in the entire Northeast region. Manipuri bed covers, silk and cotton saris, scarves and shawls are all unique in their own style and make an enchanting collection.

Manipuri language, is a Tibeto-Burman language spoken predominantly in Manipur. Smaller speech communities also exist there. Manipuri dance is famous in India.

Some of the famous personalities of Manipur of the present time are boxers Mary Kom and Dingko Singh Majority of the Manipur population belong to Hinduism (41.39%) and Christianity (41.29%) and Muslim is 8.40% Christianity is the predominant religion among tribals of Manipur and the tribal Christians make up the vast majority (over 96%) of the Christian population in Manipur. In the 20th century, a few Christian schools were established, which introduced Western-type education.

We had a full day tour of Imphal city and suburbs. The tour ended with a visit to a very different shopping place where women dominate everything. The market is called Ima Market or Ima Keithel (Mothers' Market). It is a market in the middle of Imphal city, run entirely by women. Inside the market, male shopkeepers and vendors are not allowed to sell anything.

It was established in the 16th century, following the imposition of the labour system, which required male members of the community to work in distant lands or serve in the army. As a consequence, women had to support their households by



cultivating fields or weaving textiles and selling the products in improvised markets. The market now hosts around 5,000–6,000 women vendors who sell a variety of products, such as vegetables, fruits, textiles, toys, fish, spices, utensils etc.. It is the largest all—women market in Asia.


After the shopping in Ima market, everybody returned to the Hotel for a good sleep.

She was expecting me to react

the way the parents of some of her Indian friends would. Initially, we, too, were concerned. But when we considered our daughter's future being unhappy in a profession that she didn't like for the rest of her life, we concluded that it would be best to change. Soon she changed her course of study to sociology and passed out in the same year as her friends. Taking a break from further studies, she did two years of voluntary work with City Year, a federally funded National Service Organization. It allowed her time to discern her future and a vocation she would be good at and happy with. Once she finished her work with City Year, she enrolled in a Master's degree program in Clinical Social Work at Columbia University and graduated two years later. Now she happily works as a Social Worker in California. Getting up in the morning to go to work is not a



drag for her; instead, she looks forward to it with much delight.

Our true north is where we find meaning and purpose in our lives. Frederick Buechner, a great theologian in the West, defined vocation as the place God calls you to, where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet. And Catherine of Sienna, a thirteenth-century mystic and activist, challenged people, "Be who God meant you to be, and you will set the world on fire." This may require letting go of deep familiarities, mindset, lifestyle, tradition, or perhaps your field of study.

In retrospect, I am glad we didn't throw a temper tantrum at her when Manju dared to reset and realign herself. Pulling oneself off the beaten path to begin a new in a different way though unknown and unfamiliar, can be a dizzying experience. It reminded me of Kahlil Gibran's famous words, "Your children are not your children. They are the sons and daughters of Life's longing for itself." Yes, following our lives based on 'Life's longing for itself' is neither without risks nor hardships, but not attempting to follow our calls would be a life of utter desperation like a big fish in shallow waters struggling to breathe through its gills.

Do we succumb to tradition and security, or do we dare to buck them and have a purposeful life? The choice is ours to make.
